**From Rabbi Holtz's Study ►**



Dear Friends,  
 I have commented before on the seemingly obvious connection between endings and beginnings. When

one time in our life ends, another begins. We end high school and begin college. We end our working years and begin retirement. Simple enough. The arc of our lives is linear. As the poet says, we go from birth, to death, to life everlasting. A door closes and another one opens, and we are unlikely ever to repeat the stage we were in.

But though our lives are linear, the years of our lives are cyclical – we revisit many of the same touchstones over and over again. Birthdays, holidays, seasons, even vacation spots come around reliably each year. There are always some changes, to be sure: an extra person at the seder table for example - but mostly it's the same. And we seem to like it like that. We find ourselves comforted by the familiarity, by knowing what to expect and what is expected of us. Changes, even small ones, can be jarring (just ask the Cantor about trying to introduce new High Holyday melodies!!).

And yet, though the calendar moments are basically the same, I've been noticing more and more that my responses to them change a little bit each year. As I age, as my children grow, as the congregation changes, I see things differently. The same holiday may have a different meaning this year. The linear arc of my own life meets the cycle of



the year, and suddenly I have a different understanding. And it's almost always an insight that deepens the meaning of whatever holiday or happening it is. I appreciate something in a new way or have a sense of gratitude that I didn't have before. It doesn't happen every year, and certainly not with every event, but frequently enough.

So the question I've begun asking myself is, "How do I consciously make this happen?" I love the fact that repeating events can become more and more meaningful each year. What can I do to help the process along? So far I have two ideas:

- 1- I'm trying to be more intentional and less passive. The holiday (event, vacation...) is going to come around whether I do anything or not. But what can I read/learn/plan/think about that will deepen its meaning for me this year?
- 2- I'm trying to be more present and "in the moment." Our overly-busy lives contain plenty of distractions, lots of other things to be thinking about no matter what we are actually doing at the moment. The thing is that most of those distractions are constants – they were here yesterday, and they will be here tomorrow as well. But the cyclical event (holiday, etc.) won't come around for another year. So I need to make a conscious effort to focus, to push the distractions away and refuse to let them take me out of the moment, so that I can get the most out of what I'm doing.

# Notes from Cantor Margot E.B. Goldberg



*Shalom!* Many months ago I read a quote from Anne Lamott's book *Help Thanks Wow* in Good Housekeeping magazine and was inspired. I carried the quote around reading and rereading and am now reading the book. In the prelude, Prayer 101, Lamott describes her sense of prayer:

Prayer is private, even when we pray with others.

It is communication from the heart to that which surpasses understanding. Let's say it is communication from one's heart to God. Or if that is too triggering or ludicrous a concept for you, to the Good, the force that is beyond our comprehension but that in our pain or supplication or relief we don't need to define or have proof of or any established contact with. Let's say it is what the Greeks called the Really Real, what lies within us, beyond the scrim of our values, positions, convictions, and wounds. Or let's say it is a cry from deep within to Life or Love, with capital L's.

I feel like I have spent a lot of time in the last 6 months talking to congregants, friends and family about the existence of God. I have no doubt that God exists but for some this is a difficult concept. For me and for Lamott, what is important is to believe in something, and what you label it doesn't really matter. Lamott references "the Good" and the Greeks idea of the "Really Real." For those suffering from addiction, they talk about a Higher Power. I am comfortable with the title God, with the idea that there is a spirit or energy in heaven that is guiding, protecting and there for me at all times. I have said before that for me I have no doubt of God's existence because I feel God in my heart, feel God in nature, and see God in the face of a newborn baby.

With the High Holydays upon us, we will gather as individuals to meet God, to come into contact with "that which surpasses understanding" and reflect on the year that has passed. We seek forgiveness from each other and from God and look towards the year to come with the hope of being inscribed in The Book of Life. But prayer is also about community. It is about gathering to meet and greet, to be with family and friends, to lean on each other in times of trouble or sorrow, and to raise each other up in times of *simcha*.

As a community we come into contact with God, with a Higher Power, with whatever label you are comfortable with, every time we come together to pray, study or celebrate/commemorate a lifecycle event. I hope that you will join us at TBA to explore this relationship and our relationship with your TBA community.

Barry, Tamir and I want to wish you a sweet and healthy New Year and that you and your loved ones are inscribed in The Book of Life for a good year.

## ***Our teens have lots of choices this year!***

I am proud to announce that Temple Beth Abraham has been chosen to participate in an exciting initiative for Jewish teens; a collaborative project involving congregations and JCC's throughout Westchester. The name of this initiative is the Westchester Jewish Teen Learning Initiative - WJTLI. It is designed to attract a significant number of teens to meaningful and ongoing Jewish learning opportunities and to advance teens on their life journeys with positive Jewish experiences and connections to inform decisions and values throughout their lives.

What this means is that whether your teen is into art, drama, cooking, volunteerism, the environment, or learning about Israel or Hebrew, there is a meaningful WJTLI experience for them to choose. Courses are offered at many different times of the week, range from 3 to 12 gatherings, take place in multiple locations throughout Westchester and include virtual classes for possible college credit. Any 8th-12th grade student registered for the TBA Monday program is eligible to go, for no additional fee, to any classes listed in the WJTLI catalogue!

Here at TBA, we will be offering the three WJTLI classes as part of the curriculum. First, the 9th graders will take part in Facing History, a renowned program aimed at understanding bigotry and racism. Then, our 8th and 9th graders will be offered an elective called "The Jewish Lens" which will focus on how all those pictures they constantly take can be seen through a Jewish eye.

Finally, the 11th and 12th graders take part in a course called "Israel and Me" taught by the David Project that will help them synthesize what they know about our Jewish homeland, and be savvy consumers when viewing media. And this is all between now and January – there is more to come in the Spring! Take a look and see all the cool things being offered.

# The True Meaning of Yom Kippur

Many congregants abstain from food on Yom Kippur to focus on the purpose of the day – Teshuva – repentance. For the past 22 years, Westchester congregations have made this fast experience even more significant by donating approximately \$25,000 and over 20,000 lbs. of food each Yom Kippur to the Food Bank for Westchester.

We are very pleased to announce that the Westchester Jewish Council is partnering with us on this effort and that we will be working in the year ahead with the Council and its member organizations to help raise awareness about hunger in Westchester and beyond.

Hunger continues to be an issue in our community. Even though the Food Bank distributed 7 million pounds of food last year, it wasn't enough. There is still a gap of almost 10 million meals for people who are hungry or at risk of hunger, (according to the recent 2013 Meal Gap study conducted by Feeding

America). We need your help to fill the gap to provide food for hungry people in your community.

The Food Bank is the supply and support center for 220 frontline hunger-relief programs throughout Westchester – food pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters. Each donated dollar can help the Food Bank acquire over \$4 worth of food.

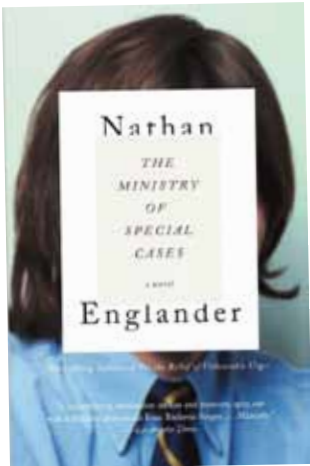

## Happy Birthday! PJ Library® Turns Three

Every month, children from over 70 families wait eagerly for the mailman. They're not interested in the bills, magazines or sales flyers; they're waiting for their latest book from PJ Library®.

Children between the ages of six months and 8 years receive a free, age-appropriate Jewish children's book or CD each month through the PJ Library program. The program celebrated its third birthday at Temple Beth Abraham this summer.

Michelle Gray, daughter of congregants Bob and Marilyn Harris and mother of 8-year-old Kelsey says, "My daughter looks forward to getting the mail just because of her PJ library books! She reads them over and over! In fact, it's the only set of books she keeps in the car."

"Our children always fight to see who gets to open the envelope," says Jessica Burris, mother of 8-year-old Shayna and 6-year-old Leah. "The kids just love the stories, and between the illustrations and messaging, my husband and I love them, too."

Some books are about holidays or Jewish folk-tales. Others are about Israel or Jewish values like *tzedakah* (charity), repairing the world (*tikkum olam*) or taking care of the environment.

"The girls jump into the books right away and we revisit them often. I love that they are jumping off points for great Jewish learning," says Rabbi Lisa Izes, mother of 7-year-old Samara and 4-year-old Jordana. "They are wonderful tools to bring alive holiday traditions, ethical concepts, and Jewish stories from other times and places."

The free books are a gift to Jewish children in the Westchester Rivertowns from Temple Beth Abraham's Harriet Verter Jewish Education Fund, the Steinhardt Foundation, and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. The program was created by the Harold

Grinspoon Foundation in Massachusetts in 2005 and now works in partnership with more than 185 Jewish communities in the US and Canada sending over 110,000 books each month. "PJ" stands for pajamas and the goal of the program is to turn snuggly bedtime moments into Jewish moments.

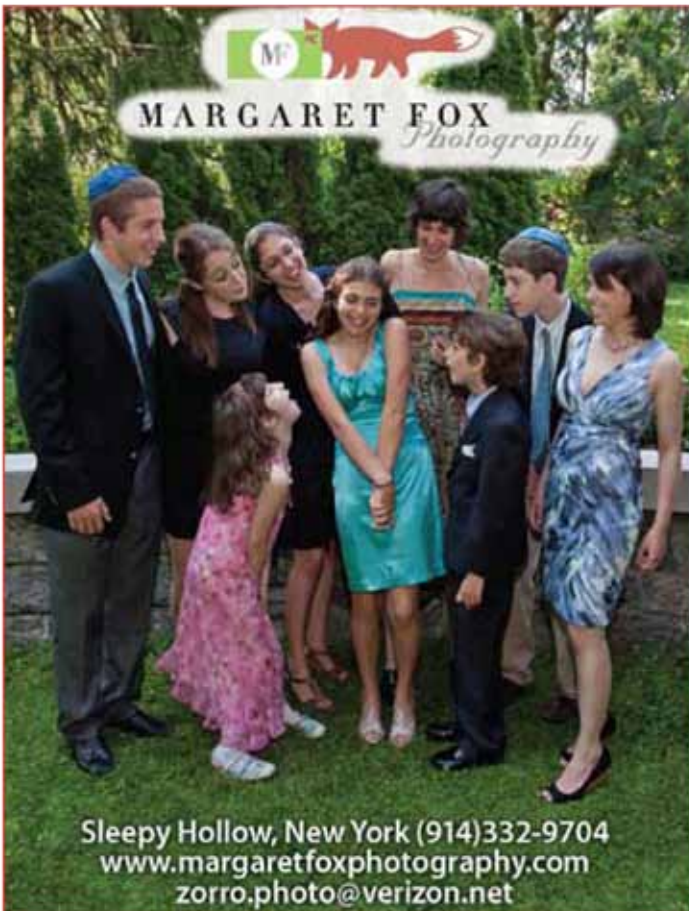
