

# Rabbi Holtz's High Holyday Message

Dear Friends,

We've been joking about it for years, but this year it is truer than it will ever be again in history: the High Holydays really **are** early this year. Erev Rosh Hashanah is September 4, just two days after Labor Day! So please, fill out the enclosed master form right now, while it's on your mind. The Holydays will be here before you know it!

Why are they so early? And, perhaps more interestingly, why will they never be quite this early again? (Well, not for about 84,000 years!)

The Jewish calendar repeats on a 19-year cycle, with leap-months added seven times during that cycle, once every two or three years. The Holydays drift gradually earlier, then a leap month pushes them later, and they drift back again. That's how we get the jokes about them always being early or late, but never on time.

However, the Lunar Year on which our calendar is based is actually 6 minutes and 25 seconds longer than the Solar Year (on which the secular, Gregorian calendar is based). This means that, approximately every 231 years, the Jewish calendar falls another full day behind the Gregorian. Next year is the year that it happens. For the next 231 years, the earliest that erev Rosh Hashanah will fall is September 5.

This is especially helpful information for those who like to plan in advance! But for those of you who, like me, have trouble planning beyond next week, we will cross that bridge when we come to it. Meanwhile, we have to get ready for **this** year.

The month of Elul, the time of preparation for the Holydays, begins on August 7. We are required to take a *cheshbon ha-nefesh* - literally "an accounting of the soul." Our job is to think about the past year, about what we've done well and what we haven't. To list those to whom we owe apologies, and from whom we'd like forgiveness. To decide if there are people in our life to whom we should offer forgiveness – sometimes the most difficult task of all. As I have said before, the few brief hours of the High Holyday services – and the few brief minutes of the silent prayer during those services – are not nearly enough time to do all the thinking that needs to be done.

I urge you not to shortchange yourself this year; start thinking now - right after you send back the enclosed forms!

#### **HIGH HOLYDAY TICKETS**

This year each TBA member will be issued a ticket for entry to all High Holyday services. Tickets are available to purchase for your adult children (over age 25), immediate family (parents/grandparents) and your guests.

Every TBA family must complete the Master Order Form to receive your tickets and any additional tickets ordered for guests.

#### YIZKOR MEMORIAL BOOK

More than any other time of the Jewish year, the High Holydays find us looking back in order to look ahead. It is a time of memories – thoughts of those who we've lost, who've enriched our past, but are not with us as we contemplate our future.

It is traditional on Yom Kippur to honor these loved ones by listing their names in the Memorial Book which is distributed during *Yizkor* services. To turn the pages of the book is to turn through time, and to remind ourselves that those remembered are never really gone. The book is a declaration of love and a testament of thanks to those who came before.

#### HIGH HOLYDAY FLOWER DEDICATION

TBA will provide babysitting by **reservation only** for Erev Rosh Hashanah, Rosh Hashanah – Days I and 2, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur. Children (ages 2-8) will be provided with snacks, craft projects, and music in Nursery School and Religious School classrooms. Children must be signed into their age appropriate classroom and won't be able to leave unless accompanied by a responsible parent, guardian or authorized person.
