From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

"A decade before the Civil War, when North Tarrytown was a very small community, of the estimated 20,000 Jews who lived in the United States at that time, 19,999 lived elsewhere. One Jew, namely Abraham Levy, had

found his way to Tarrytown around 1850, probably with a pack on his back, to become the first Jewish settler in our villages. Other Jewish families slowly joined Mr. Levy over the decades, and by the end of the century, there were about 15 Jewish families in the area. With the arrival of Rabbi Samuel Gordon in 1899, a Jewish congregation was born. They called themselves the Hebrew Congregation of North Tarrytown and Tarrytown." [From *The History of Temple Beth Abraham*, by Ruth Biloon]

That was how we began, 125 years ago! Founded in the last year of the 19th century as an Orthodox shul, the Temple Beth Abraham of the 21st century is an egalitarian synagogue with several styles of worship. From the small, Lithuanian style *shtiebel* on Valley Street, with women upstairs, to a bright, fully accessible building on Leroy Avenue, the physical trappings of our congregation have changed quite a bit over the years!

Of course, many of the important things remain the same. As a community, we still celebrate one another's simchas, grieve for each other's losses, turn to the synagogue in times of crisis and look to the Religious School to educate our children and help keep our heritage alive. We have been and continue to truly be a congregational family.

However, as synagogues across the country have discovered, it may be that the very definition of what it means to be part of a congregational family has changed. What does it mean to us today? What are the privileges of belonging? What are the responsibilities? What should change, and what must not change? These are important, even foundational questions for the next 125 years in the life of Temple Beth Abraham. So this coming year, in addition to all of the moments of celebration, we will be spending some time this year talking about what being part of a congregation means in general, and what it means to each of us as individuals and families. What draws us in today, and what do we think will draw our children and grandchildren?

Cantor's Notes

Let's start at the very beginning....


As you get to know me, you'll quickly figure out that one of my biggest passions is musical theater. I'm particularly fascinated by the intersection of musical

theater and Jewish identity. In *The Sound of Music*, Maria Von Trapp reminds us of the importance of "starting at the very beginning." As we approach this season of new beginnings – new Jewish year, new school year, new Torah cycle, new cantor – I am reminded of the many Broadway composers who were inspired by the Biblical beginnings of the Book of Genesis. From the creation of the world to Noah's ark to Joseph and his brothers, let's look at four musicals rooted in our sacred texts.

The Apple Tree: The Apple Tree is a series of three one-act musicals with music by Jerry Bock and lyrics Sheldon Harnick (both of Fiddler on the Roof fame). The vignettes are connected because they each tell a story about someone who believes that they want something, but once they get what they wanted they realize that it wasn't what they wanted after all. The first act is based on Mark Twain's The Diaries of Adam and Eve. The Biblical firsts that Adam and Eve experience in the Garden of Eden become musical comedy gold, particularly with regards to Eve's pregnancy with Cain. Eve doesn't understand the changes happening to her body and Adam is convinced that the newborn baby is a fish and not a human. Although there are not too many direct references to the original Biblical text, there are a few nods to the Midrash – for example, the show begins with Adam naming the animals in the Garden of Eden. The bulk of the story creates its own musical Midrash regarding the development of the relationship between Adam and Eve and how they interact with each other.

Children of Eden: The first act of Stephen Schwartz's 1991 musical Children of Eden tells the story of Adam and Eve and their children Cain and Abel in the Garden of Eden. Act II continues into the next Torah portion with the story of Noah and the flood. Although the show has not had much commercial success, the show's publisher, Musical Theater International, reports that Children of Eden is one of the company's top 20 licensed productions for schools and community theaters. Children of Eden takes a broader look at the life of Adam and Eve and their children, including their expulsion from Eden, the first murder, and Adam and Eve's eventual death. The musical incorporates "storytellers" and a God-like character named "Father" as narrators who set the scene and provide commentary. In the second act, the generations are traced down from Adam and Eve's children Seth and Cain all the way down to Noah. The narrative is focused largely on Noah's own family dynamics, which are mentioned only in passing in the Biblical text. Instead of seeking guidance from God, Noah turns to his family for hope. The dove in this version of the story represents not only the receding waters and the return to more peaceful times but reconciliation of estrangement in Noah's own family.

Two by Two: Two by Two represents an earlier musical theater interpretation of the story of Noah and the flood. It enjoyed marginally more success than *Children of Eden*; however, it is not widely produced for modern audiences. The 1970 musical features a score by Richard Rodgers, written nearly ten years after the death of his widely acclaimed collaborator Oscar Hammerstein. This time, Rodgers teams up with book writer Peter Stone and lyricist Martin Charnin. The original production starred Danny Kaye, who literally broke a leg during the show's Broadway run. No bother, though – his performance in a wheelchair made him even more believable as 600-year-old Noah!

Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat: This is by far the most successful and well-known theatrical adaptation of the Book of Genesis. Its universal appeal comes from a combination of its clever exploration of the family dynamics between Joseph and his brothers and the wide variety of musical genres that it incorporates. From Caribbean calypso to French cabaret to Elvis-style Rock and Roll, Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice weave together a Biblical adaptation that is catchy, accessible and engaging. It's not all fun and games, though - the poignant song, "Close Every Door," which Joseph sings while imprisoned, evokes the importance of Jewish memory while referring to the Holocaust: "Just give me a number instead of my name - forget all about me and let me decay." It also alludes to the importance of Jewish community: "Children of Israel are never alone." The musical has been produced in more than 82 countries across the globe, with an estimate of over 30 million people who have seen it live.

We are pleased to welcome back Cantor Nancy Abramson, who has conducted our Conservative High Holyday Services for the past two years. This spring, she retired as director of the H.L. Miller Cantorial School at the Jewish Theological Seminary. At the Seminary she trained future cantors in prayer and religious leadership and oversaw the school's curriculum development and Israel program. She received undergraduate degrees from the joint program of Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary, earned a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University's Teachers College and received her cantorial training at JTS. She received an honorary doctorate from JTS in 2018. Cantor Abramson is a past president of the Cantors Assembly and was the first female president in the Assembly's history. Before coming to JTS she served as cantor at the Park Avenue Synagogue and West End Synagogue in Manhattan and Congregation Sons of Israel in Westchester. She taught at the Abraham Joshua Heschel School in New York and directed the music program at Camp Ramah in Wisconsin and in New England. She has been a cantor/scholar-in-residence in communities throughout the United States.



The word selichot means forgiveness, and for 500 years Jews have held a service on the Saturday evening before Rosh Hashanah to start the process of seeking forgiveness. It is a brief, powerful and beautiful ritual, during which we put the Torah scrolls in their white mantles, introduce the musical themes of the Holydays, and prepare ourselves for the season of repentance.
