From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

It has been more than three weeks since the Hamas atrocities in southern Israel, and we are just at the beginning of what may come to be known as the Simchat Torah War. As of this writing, Israeli ground troops have just begun their advance into Gaza.

The horrific nature of the terrorist assault led to expressions of support not only from Israel's friends around the world, but also from nations that have typically been less than understanding. Even places like the UK found it possible to condemn the carnage. Perhaps, in addition to true sympathy – what human being with any sense of morality could not have been sympathetic? – there was also some understanding from these governments that what occurred in Israel on that Shabbat morning was the indication of something dangerous to everyone. As Peggy Noonan put it:

"There is no cause on earth that justifies what these murderers did. There is no historical grievance that excuses or 'gives greater context' to their actions. Spare me 'this is the inevitable result when a people are long abused.' No, this is what happens when savages hold the day: They imperil the very idea of civilization."

It is unfortunately no surprise that there are many people - including some of our friends and including some Jews - who do not understand this. They will see any Israeli response as illegitimate.

The good news, however, is that there are many, many people who not only understand, but support the Jewish community wholeheartedly. Many of them are other faith leaders. I immediately received calls and emails from Rivertowns clergy asking how we are doing and if they could be of help. The Episcopal church in Irvington started flying an Israeli flag. Even as we push back against the haters here and abroad, we must not give in to despair, to the feeling that we Jews are alone in the world. We are not alone! If we are going to have the emotional strength we each need to continue our loud and

An Especially Mar Cheshvan

The High Holy Days are behind us and as I write this we are about to welcome the month of *Cheshvan*. Cheshvan

is known affectionately in Jewish circles as "Mar Cheshvan," which means "Sad Cheshvan." The month is considered to be sad because there are no Jewish holidays. This stands in vast contrast to the month of *Tishrei*, which is ripe with celebration: A new Jewish year, our Day of Atonement, our most joyful festival of Sukkot, and the beginning and ending of our Torah cycle. No wonder there's a running joke that Jewish clergy love Cheshvan – after a season of non-stop holidays, we can finally settle down and relax.

But not this year. This year, we welcome an especially "Mar Cheshvan," particularly for our brothers and sisters in Israel. On the morning of Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah, the grand finale of the Tishrei holiday marathon, Hamas terrorists infiltrated Israeli towns and homes. They brutally murdered and kidnapped innocent civilians: men, women, children, senior citizens – no one was safe. Families were ripped apart; parents had to shield their children from bullets. Houses were set aflame so that even the so-called "safe rooms" or bomb shelters would no longer protect people. We prayed for rain on Shemini Atzeret and instead got tears. Israelis tried to dance with the Torah, but instead had to shelter in place. And while it's hard to imagine the situation getting any worse, the truth is we don't know how things will turn out. All we know is Israel is at war and that we are not okay – and that the fact that Hamas engaged in these attacks on one of the most joyful days on the Jewish calendar was no doubt intentional.

My hope is that by the time you read this, the sadness of Cheshvan will have lifted somewhat. I've found solace from community gatherings, especially the one we held here at TBA. I've enjoyed listening to musical and poetic offerings from friends and colleagues. I've been lucky to have several non-Jewish friends check in on me and am touched by their innate understanding that this is not a political or religious war – this is a humanitarian crisis. It should not be so difficult to separate the two. I find comfort in the fact that a neighbor of mine who I have never met in person has hung an Israeli flag on his lawn, which reminds me that while hate is rampant, love and faith can bring us together in unexpected ways.

As Naomi Shemer reminds us in her famous song, "Al Kol Eileh," there can be no bitterness without sweetness, and vice versa. While the bitterness of this moment may seem overwhelming, we pray for a day when the balance will s As Naomi Shemer reminds us in her famous song, "Al Kol Eileh," it is impossible to have bitterness without sweetness and vice versa. Simchat Torah was a joyous celebration at TBA. Our new learners were consecrated, which shows that we, as a community, support them in their learning. So many young learners, excited to be at Synagogue. There were giggles emanating from the back of the room: kids playing, praying, and dancing. We danced with the Torahs and our children sat surrounded by an unrolled scroll, with our adults holding it up. It was magical to sit with the kids and point things out as Rabbi David explained each section of the Torah. Eyes widened in wonder. At the end of the night we had some kids crying that they just did not want to leave TBA. They wanted to stay because it is their favorite place, and they love being Jewish.

And the next day, we woke up...and the world was different.

On October 7, 2023, Jewish people were murdered, kidnapped, and brutalized in Israel. The Jewish joy we felt the night before had transformed into a collective fear, sadness, and for some, loneliness. Our hearts turned towards Israel, and towards the loved ones, friends, and those we know that are there. Many have sought fellowship, and it has been so powerful coming together as a TBA community in different ways. For lack of better words, it has been sad and scary, but together, we have found strength.

One source of strength that I have seen is the connection that we have made across generational lines. Through classes, services, and our shofar club, there have been opportunities for intergenerational learning. Learning from older members of our community is something that we don't often do. I was inspired by programs like the Shofar Club, where TBA members like Lee Parker, and educators like Rabbi Justin Schwartz, have met with TBA learners.

I am hoping to continue programming like this, which gives our youth opportunities to learn and enjoy Judaism with our community at large. It is through members, programming, and funds like The Fran Friedman Fund for the Enrichment of Children and the Harriet Verter Jewish Education Fund, that make all of this possible. Whether you can donate to a fund, or donate time, we are always so grateful.

There are also many other great ways to join together. There are volunteer opportunities in the school office and the temple office, as a board of education member or class parent, or as an usher at our new entrance. We also have our 4th Grade Mitzvah Project, where we welcome members of our community to the school, on Sunday, November 19th.

Please reach out if you have any interest in volunteering, getting involved in intergenerational programming, or just would like to connect. I know, right now, connection is what many are needing. Whatever your involvement, I look forward to seeing you at Temple Beth Abraham, as we continue to forge community, together.

I sweetest thing of all. Of course, this particular brand of bitterness is on a scale that Israel has not seen since the Yom Kippur War fifty years ago. Back then, it was unclear whether Israel as a nation would survive. However, as Rabbi David has reminded us in the days and weeks following the attacks, "no one is thinking that today."

Israel is a nation founded on hope – after all, her national anthem is called "Hatikvah" – the hope. Whenever we sing "Hatikvah," we are reminded of the longevity of our connection to the Jewish homeland – we sing of the two-thousand year hope to be a free people in our land – the land of Zion and Jerusalem.

Once we emerge from Mar Cheshvan, the next holiday we celebrate on the Jewish calendar is Chanukah, our festival of light. It is fitting that Hanukkah comes at the darkest time of the year because over the course of the eight nights, we literally increase the amount of light we bring into the world. Amidst the sadness and destruction, let us look towards the future and pray that our flames of Jewish community, solidarity, and hope will continue to burn for generations to come.





Today multiracial Jews comprise up to 10-25% of Jewish population in parts of the United States, with nearly 87,000 nonwhite, Hispanic, or multiracial Jewish households in the New York area alone. Most people tend to think of multiracial as a fairly recent phenomenon, but in this talk Professor Leibman reveals the early history of multiracial Jews in the United States and Caribbean and explains how their stories got lost in common tellings of Jewish American history.

Laura Arnold Leibman is the William R. Kenan Jr. Professor of English and Humanities at Reed College, Vice President of Program (AJS), and the author of *The Art of the Jewish Family: A History of Women in Early New York in Five Objects* (Bard Graduate Center, 2020) which won three National Jewish Book Awards. Her *Once We Were Slaves* (Oxford UP, 2021) is about an early multiracial Jewish family who began their lives enslaved in the Caribbean and became some of the wealthiest Jews in New York. Her book *Jews Across the Americas 1492-present: A Sourcebook*, co-edited with Adriana Brodsky was released September 2023 from NYU Press.
