From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

In my sermon last Monday morning I suggested that Yom Kippur is a 25-hour long memento mori (reminder of our mortality). However, the point is not to depress us, but to remind us to use our time in better, more

positive ways. And I made a connection between the somber and difficult prayers of Yom Kippur and the joyous celebrations of Sukkot and Simchat Torah. I suggested that the fact that these holydays occur so close together is not an accident of the calendar. We are not expected to wallow in sadness. Rather, we take an extended period of time to consider our wrongdoings, and then we continue with life. More than continue: we **celebrate** life.

Sukkot is called z'man simchateinu – season of our rejoicing. Simchat Torah literally means a celebration of Torah – we rejoice in Torah, which, as all of our b'mitzvah kids know is "the secret of our people's lives from Sinai until now."

I've always been bemused by the fact that the biggest crowds of the year come to Temple on Yom Kippur, the most difficult of days, but don't come back four days later for the celebration!

Sukkot is a holiday which is not personal but communal. It is not primarily about our relationship with God, but about our relationships with each other. Start with the building of the sukkah itself, a task which is so much easier with a group. The most important thing you do in a sukkah is eat, and it is customary to invite lots of people each day to join you for a meal in your sukkah. Connected to this is the Kabbalistic practice of *ushpizin*, which is the act of inviting "spiritual guests" into your sukkah – traditionally Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Aaron, Joseph and David.

At the High Holydays we are reminded of our finite nature. On Sukkot we respond to this existential angst by turning to those around us, family and friends. By being part of a community which celebrates with us in times of joy, and cradles us in loving arms in times of sorrow. Sukkot comes to teach us that though the New Year will have its share of good and bad, everything about life is better when it is shared with others.

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Cantor's Notes

A Time for Joy!

Each Jewish festival has a corresponding scroll of the Bible associated with it. On Sukkot, it is traditional to read from Kohelet (also known as the Book of

Ecclesiastes). Kohelet explores the futility of mundane pursuits and pleasures as Kohelet himself searches for a deeper meaning to life.

On the outset, the Book of Ecclesiastes appears to be extremely depressing. This is ironic, given that Sukkot is the festival on which we are commanded to be most joyful. However, Kohelet's frustration and sadness ultimately enable us to appreciate the simple joys that we experience on an ordinary day. The themes of Kohelet relate to Sukkot because the holiday is traditionally celebrated with the construction of temporary dwelling places. We move outside our home, which provides a sense of permanence and comfort, dwelling instead in a flimsy hut. This reminds us of how lucky we are to be able to have four walls and a roof above our head during the rest of the year. It also gives us an opportunity to commune with nature and to appreciate our place in the greater scheme of the circle of life.

Sukkot also celebrates the end of the harvest season, as crops are gathered and stored for the coming year. It's a moment of great satisfaction, as we can literally see the fruits of our labor gathered all in one place. Kohelet reminds us that while mundane accomplishments are often fleeting and empty, the close of the harvest gives us a tangible example of achievement and fulfillment.


Kohelet's story has been adapted into popular culture, which speaks to its timelessness and to its relevance to our lives today. Here are two examples, one from folk rock and one from musical theater:

"Turn Turn Turn"

In writing the classic song "Turn Turn" in 1959, Pete Seeger took words from chapter 3 of Kohelet directly from the King James version of the Bible. Fun fact: In 1999, Seeger arranged for 45% of the songwriting royalties for "Turn! Turn! Turn!" to be donated to the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions, a group opposed to Israeli settlements which describes itself as "an Israeli peace and human rights organization dedicated to ending the occupation of the Palestinian territories and achieving a just peace between Israelis and Palestinians." It's interesting to think of this organization's mission in conjunction with the actions depicted in the verses as well as the themes of Sukkot. On Sukkot we both "build up" and "break down" our temporary structures. The settlement issue – while contentious – comes with the ultimate goal of building love and peace as opposed to hate and war.

But Seeger made sure to protect his own interests as well: He kept 50% of the royalties for his own music and took a further 5% for the lyrics because, in Seeger's own words, "[in addition to the music] I did write six words and one



A chavurah is a small group of temple members who are brought together based on common interests.


A chavurah group is made up of individuals and/or families who usually get together monthly.

more word repeated three times." The repeated word, of course, is no other than "turn turn" itself. The other phrase comes towards the end of the song: "I swear it's not too late." A time for peace – I swear it's not too late." This reminds us that our path towards peace continues indefinitely – we must continuously work toward building wholeness and harmony.

"Turn Turn Turn" has become so synonymous with Sukkot that it is canonized in our liturgy and is included in our prayer book, Mishkan Tefilah. Although Seeger wrote the original song, the Byrds turned it into an international hit in 1965.

"Corner of the Sky" from Pippin by Stephen Schwartz

Believe it or not, there is also a musical theater interpretation of Kolelet! The protagonist and title character of Stephen Schwartz's beloved musical Pippin is arguably based on Ecclesiastes. Pippin is a young prince who feels unfulfilled and goes off on a hero's journey to find his purpose and passion in life. Towards the beginning of the musical, he outlines his hopes in the song "Corner of the Sky." The lyrics, "everything has its season, everything has its time" are Schwartz's own interpretation of "for everything there is a season and a time for every purpose under heaven." Both Pippin and Kohelet draw on the importance of finding meaning beyond one's own self – whether it be through God, faith, or love. To some extent they reach the same conclusion, too: that the best chance for fulfillment is to be found through relationships with family and the simplicity of an ordinary day.

In addition, Ecclesiastes 12:1 includes the following passage: "Appreciate your vigor in the days of your youth, before those days of sorrow come and those years arrive of which you will say, I have no pleasure in them." Pippin's grandmother, Berthe, reminds him of this ideal in her show-stopping song, "No Time At All." With the wisdom of age, Berthe is able to look back at her youth and smile. She tells her grandson that "when your best days are yester, the rest are twice as dear" before launching into an exuberant chorus: "Oh, it's time to start livin', time to take a little from this world we're given time to take time, cause spring will turn to fall - in just no time at all!" The lesson we learn from both Kohelet and from Pippin is to life our best lives and to be our best selves while we can.

Connecting these well-known songs to their biblical origins gives us a deeper understanding of the universality of Biblical teachings and themes. May the teachings of Kohelet, Pete Seeger, and Stephen Schwartz inspire us to find meaning on this Sukkot and beyond, enabling us to appreciate life's simple joys.





For decades, the tiny Jewish shtetl of Kreskol existed in happy isolation, virtually untouched and unchanged. Spared by the Holocaust and the Cold War, its residents enjoyed remarkable peace. It missed out on cars, and electricity, and the internet, and indoor plumbing. But when a marriage dispute spins out of control, the whole town comes crashing into the twenty-first century.


