From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

We are all quite concerned with the rise in antisemitic incidents in New York, and in the country at large. We know that this ancient hatred

has never fully disappeared in America, but we also know that, until quite recently, there had been a steady decline in actual acts of hate. Over the past few years, the haters have been emboldened to crawl out from under their rocks. Though their actual impact in terms of total numbers of incidents is relatively small, the uncertainty they have engendered in our community is substantial.

Even as we increase our vigilance, we have to remember how different the Jewish experience in America has been from that of Jews in other countries, and how positive it remains. Both the House and the Senate have Bipartisan Task Forces for Combating Antisemitism, which in and of itself is unique in the world. In early December they sent a letter to President Biden calling for increased interagency coordination and collaboration.

In response, the President announced a task force to coordinate government efforts to address antisemitism and other forms of religious bigotry. Its first order of business is to create "a national strategy to counter antisemitism."

The presidential Press Secretary said, "This strategy will raise understanding about antisemitism and the threat it poses to the Jewish community and all Americans, address antisemitic harassment and abuse both online and offline, seek to prevent antisemitic attacks and incidents, and encourage whole-of-society efforts to counter antisemitism and build a more inclusive nation."

This is a very hopeful first step. At the same time, we cannot be content to leave the battle against hate with the government. We must also do our part.

The single best way to create a societal bulwark against antisemitism is to build coalitions of like-minded people. This involves establishing meaningful ties with other minority and ethnic

Shalom! The Israelites stood at the foot of Mount Sinai, a ragtag group of former-slaves, and received the 613 commandments, one of which is a commandment to live a life of righteousness. According to www.myjewishlearning.com, "the covenant included specific provisions for human relations, including establishing fair courts, protecting the vulnerable (the non-Israelite, the widow, the orphan, and the poor), lending to the needy without interest, treating wage laborers fairly, and much more." In later chapters of the Torah, we hear the commandment, Tzedek, tzedek tirdof, Justice, justice shall you pursue (Deuteronomy 16:20)! This is what it means to be a tzadik, a righteous person.


According to the URJ website: "For more than six decades, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (the RAC) has worked to educate, inspire, and mobilize the Reform Jewish Movement to advocate for social justice. We have helped activate the Jewish community in the key debates and mobilizations of each generation since our founding, from the civil rights movement to immigration reform."

Each year, the Reform Movement honors the legacy of the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by commemorating the Shabbat around MLK Day as a *Shabbat Tzedek*. During this special Shabbat, we remember the life and work of King, and celebrate the hard-fought victories of the civil rights movement. Please join us on January 13th at 7:30pm and January 14th at 9:00am to reflect on and recommit to fighting racial injustice.

The importance of the history of our Movement's dedication as upstanders in the fight for racial equality and equality for all people will be reflected in our Shabbat services. The Friday Shabbat evening service will incorporate special readings and music with themes of righteousness. Services on Shabbat morning will include, as always, a prayer for our country, a prayer for the State of Israel, and a prayer for peace during the Torah service; a special reading about equality in commemoration of MLK will be added to the service.

THE BIBLE PLAYERS

The Bible Players, a Torah comedy team, are coming to work with our Religious School sudents and teachers at TBA on March 12. The event is being sponsored by the Fran Friedman Fund for the Enrichment of Children.

The Bible Players, based out of New York City, Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles, teach Jewish values through theater and improve to infuse comedy and laughs into tales from the Torah, Jewish values, and beyond.

Since its founding in 2011, The Bible Players have toured America from New York to Texas to California, bringing their unique show to thousands of people of all backgrounds and ages, from Pre-K to adults. They've performed in 30 states and do more than 100 programs a year.

On March 12 TBA will learn about the Jewish value of *Chesed*, loving kindness, through improv, games, and lots of fun. After school, TBA educators will also do some learning with The Bible Players. At a staff meeting, TBA educators will learn how to infuse improv, drama and comedy into Jewish education and their teaching.



ERICA NEWMAN DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS AND ENGAGEMENT

For the past several months I have talked about volunteer opportunities in the office. Jewish tradition teaches us that humanity must play an active role in the world. *Tikkun Olam* – repairing the world – expresses the value of volunteering in Judaism. As we approach Martin Luther King, Jr. Day we should all take a moment to look at what is imperfect in our world and how can we make it better, more whole. How can we give it forward?

I took this job because I saw the opportunity to make something better for this community. TBA has been a warm, welcoming and inclusive spiritual home for me and my family. A place to recharge, to reflect, to break bread with friends, to learn, and to make new friends. My goal is that each of us finds our connection to TBA and a deeper connection to faith.

That said, there is work to be done. If you attended the annual congregational meetings then you know our budget deficit has continued to grow. We have ratified increasingly negative budgets for the past two years. My goal is that in 5 years we can balance that deficit and ensure that we are moving in a sustainable direction for the future.

TBA is about to enter into its 125th year. Years ago we made the switch to an annual commitment model to allow membership to be available to all with dignity and respect. The basis of this model is to give what you can. This model has allowed us to be a more inclusive community, but, it also means we can no longer rely on annual dues to support our operating budget. That said, what can be done to make TBA sustainable for the next 125 years?

In the coming months TBA will be launching an endowment initiative to grow our endowment. The endowment at TBA is a way we can ensure the future. The monies from an endowment are invested and a percentage of the income from the endowment is used for operating expenses while the principal will grow for years to come. Gifts can be made today, or as a legacy gift. A small percentage of your estate, your IRA, your life insurance policy, for example, can be gifted to TBA for the future.

The first 125 years at TBA were given to us by those who came before us. It is up to us to give the next 125 years to those who come after us. 
groups, helping them by our very presence to see past the stereotypes repeated endlessly by haters. At the same time, we learn to see past the stereotypes we might hold about these other groups. No one group can fight hate alone; it must be a group effort.

The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. understood this very clearly, which was one reason he actively sought out the support of the Jewish community in combating segregation. And even while seeking help, he knew that we are all in this fight together. In one of his most moving speeches, Dr. King said "If my Jewish brothers and sisters said to me amid antisemitism anywhere, 'we don't need your support, we have enough power to deal with this problem ourselves,' I would still take a stand against antisemitism because it's wrong, it's unjust, and it's evil."

This is one of the reasons that I participate each year in the MLK Jr. Day service at Foster Memorial Church in Tarrytown. It is the right thing to do, and it helps build bridges and break down stereotypes. Your presence is needed. Please join me on Monday, January 16 at noon.


Tanakh Study - Wednesdays, 10:00-11:00am, In Person AND via Zoom No session on January 11






