From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

Eleven years ago, we began a social action project we dubbed, "EverylCounts." It started as a reimagining of a biblical custom known as the "counting of the *omer*."

The 49 day "counting" began as a period of thanksgiving for the spring barley harvest in Israel. It later merged with the belief that there were exactly seven weeks between the Exodus from Egypt to the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. In other words, 49 days between the second day of Passover and the beginning of Shavuot.

The Torah says that on the second day of Passover, the priest would lift an *omer* (sheaf) of barley before God to signify thanks for the harvest which had just begun. We read: "And from the day on which you bring the sheaf...you shall count off seven weeks. They must be complete: you must count until the day after the seventh week-fifty days; then you shall bring an offering of new grain to the Lord."

Once the Temple was destroyed and the Jews exiled, the counting of the *omer* changed. The rabbis of the Talmud (4th-6th centuries) understood it as a period of semi-mourning. Traditional Jews will not get married during the fifty days between Passover and Shavuot, and won't even cut their hair. The only exception you may recall from your own religious school days: the holiday of Lag b'Omer - the 33rd day of the *omer*. On that day, say the sages, a plague in Israel was lifted, so it is a day of joy.

The Kabbalists of Safed (16th century) had a different take on the counting of the *omer*. They understood it as a season of serious introspection and preparation that each person goes through in order to receive the Torah on Shavuot. The period begins with Redemption (the Exodus at Passover) and ends with Revelation (the giving of Torah at Shavuot). Each day of the counting represents a different aspect of our personality and our relationship with other people and with God.

Today, traditional Jews add a special prayer to the evening service between Passover and Shavuot, and each night they announce which day of the omer it is. We move, as did the Israelites, toward Mt. Sinai and our covenant with God. For many this is a very powerful period of time. But as important as the run-up to Shavuot is in Judaism, this simple daily counting in and of itself is hardly inspiring.

Shalom! When I arrived as your Cantor in the summer of 1994, I could never have imagined the evolution of Purim at TBA. We started small with a Disney themed service. I acquired a pink flowing princess gown which I have worn many times, much to the delight of pre-school children and in all honesty, myself. Then in 1999, in the famous words of Judy Garland and Mickey Rooney, "my uncle's got a barn, let's put on a show," I purchased our first "Norman Roth Shpiel" and we were off and running. Norman Roth wrote shpiels for Stephen Wise Free Synagogue in Manhattan, his home synagogue, and then sold them to other institutions the following year. As our own cast of talented congregants learned the mechanics of shpiel writing, they thought about writing our own. For Purim 2004, a past TBA congregant, Heather Steinberg, wrote a "Disco Shpiel" and the legacy began. (David Kaufmann, do you remember writing the lyrics for Stayin' Alive?) Since those early years, Heather was joined by Hope, Pam, and Sarah Barkley, Melissa Baer, Andrea Bergman

This year, we looked through all of the shpiels we have performed over the years, curating our favorite moments and put them together to create this year's shpiel. Producing shpiels takes a long time. I often say, "it's like herding cats," but I love it! Working with our dramaturges, cast (adults, teens, and kids) and our amazing accompanist, Dror Perl, is always an amazing experience. I am grateful for everyone's generosity of time and amazed by their talents.



I hope you don't mind indulging me every month with my updates from the office. It has not been our tradition, but it is my intention to engage more of you in what TBA is doing on a more regular basis. I sincerely hope at least a few of you are reading this column and finding yourselves included.

Here we are on the precipice of spring and a lot is blooming at TBA. Look for an email soon with opportunities to sponsor parts of our new playground, our Gala in April, the end of year picnic in May, and the return of the Children's Garden Center at Temple Beth Abraham in the fall. We want to hear from you about what you want from our community. What programs, new or old, can we provide to make your time at TBA meaningful and valuable? I hope to send out a few surveys soon and I would love to know more about how this community can support one another. Please send me a note with your thoughts.

Messages from our committee chairs will come your way eliciting more feedback on how to engage and provide value to our community.

Thinking about what we offer our members; you may know that this organization has operated with a deficit budget for the past three years. TBA took a stand that we would make our programs accessible to all regardless of their ability to pay and we will continue that model. Accessibility for all; whether physically arriving at our building, engaging at our services, learning in our religious school, are at the heart of TBA and who we are as a community. As such, we moved to our voluntary commitment model where we ask people to pay what they can and we never turn families away regardless of their ability to pay.

All this good will does require a financial commitment from those that can pay to support those that cannot. In this year we have seen a 5% decline in the number of families giving at the sustaining level. While we are looking for new revenue streams, such as increasing our endowment fund so we have monies to use from the interest on an annual basis and adding a nursery school program at TBA, we are asking you to look at a model defined by "pay what you can."

We want your donations to be meaningful. Is it meaningful for you to know that your donation has supported a family who otherwise would not be able to worship at any synagogue and we have welcomed them into our doors with dignity, respect and accessibility? If this speaks to who you are and you have the means, we hope that you will consider increasing your annual commitment. This year only 25% of our congregation has donated at the sustaining level. Will you join them to close the gap? For this model to work over time, we need to increase those that can give to support others that cannot.

There are many ways to get involved and many projects that need both financial and physical support and, as always, let me know what TBA can provide for you and for your family.

Today, traditional Jews add a special prayer to the evening service between Passover and Shavuot, and each night they announce which day of the *omer* it is. But as important as the run-up to Shavuot is in Judaism, this simple daily counting in and of itself is hardly inspiring.

But here's another possibility: Rabbi Jacob Milgrom says that in the Bible just as today, the harvest –and therefore the farmer – was totally dependent on the weather. He suggests that the ancient Israelites were terrified that the harvest would be destroyed by bad weather, so they made a barley offering of thanksgiving each day to God, and counted the days until the harvest was successfully completed. Those of us living in Westchester are not farmers, but the economic gyrations due to the pandemic have reminded us all that it does not take much to make our own fiscal situation pretty precarious. And just as our ancestors gave thanks for the harvest, we can and should give thanks for our own blessings. And that's where EverylCounts comes in.

We are going to do a completely modern, liberal Jewish remake of the counting of the *omer*. I hope that you will all participate. We will make available to every Temple family an EverylCounts "kit" to help you count the Omer. It will consist of a very large bag which we want you to place in a conspicuous place in your home, a sticker to use on a *tzedakah* jar, and blessings for you to say, among other things. If you are a Religious School family, your (youngest enrolled) child will receive the kit. If you don't have a child in the religious school you will need to pick up your kit at TBA. We will also make everything in the kit (except the large bag!) available to you to print at home on our website at: http://tba-ny.org/everylcounts.

Every day for fifty days, from the second day of Passover until Shavuot, we want you to put one can, box, or jar of food for the hungry into the bag. If you don't have the room for that, put a set amount of *tzedakah* aside each day – actual cash each day, not a lump sum at the end! As you do it, recite the blessing we'll send you, giving thanks for having enough to eat and enough to share. At the end of seven weeks, you will have fifty items to bring to Temple for donation to the local food pantry. And as a result of your daily offering, you may very well have a much stronger sense of gratitude, of appreciation for your blessings.

This is a brilliant way for us to do Judaism: re-purpose an ancient ritual, have it remind us of the important connection between the Exodus and the giving of Torah, have it provide us with a deepened spiritual sense of gratitude, and have it provide a way for our entire family to celebrate and participate in repairing the world. Please, give it a try. I think it's going to be amazing.

From the Ritual Committee (Sharon Kirschner and Steven Haber, co-chairs)

A little about us, what we do, what our thoughts and goals are (and an invitation to join us!)

The Ritual Committee of Temple Beth Abraham works with and supports Rabbi Holtz and Cantor Goldberg in all matters related to worship and ritual at Temple Beth Abraham – whether it's Shabbat, the High Holydays, Holidays and Festivals, or special programs. Some of the programs supported by the Ritual Committee so far this year include the afternoon programming and ushering for the High Holidays, inviting congregants for candle lighting and Kiddush at Reform Shabbat services when there isn't a B-Mitzvah family, Sukkah decorating, and Simchat Torah, the "Chanukah party that wasn't" due to the weather (but it would have been fabulous!), and the recent take home Parsley for Planting Kits for Tu B'Shevat.







At our monthly meetings we start with a quick study of the week's Torah portion, receive updates from the clergy about what they're working on and then we discuss what's happening currently and what's coming up at TBA. There are a few months we truly focus on EVERYTHING related to the High Holydays at TBA, but the rest of the year we talk about anything and everything related to worship and ritual at TBA--Shabbat and special services, prayer, music, in-person and on-line worship and lifecycle rituals. We are also looking at the website and how to better talk about prayer, ritual and services at TBA.

From the Ritual Committee (Sharon Kirschner and Steven Haber, co-chairs), continued.

This year we plan to undertake some new initiatives with the goal of better serving and engaging the TBA community through all kinds of ritual moments. We're in the process of creating subcommittees to look at the following needs:

- Lifecycle support and identifying other lifecycle moments. What more can we do to provide resources or support for congregants going through life cycle events and what are some of the lifecycle moments beyond birth, B-Mitzvah, illness, weddings and funerals? What are some prayers and resources we can provide to help our congregants create meaningful unveilings? What are some of the other moments in our lives that might be marked by a meaningful ritual such as a naming for a transitioning child or adult, or sending a child to college or moving or becoming an empty nester? How can we acknowledge and mark these, and more, moments on a spiritual level?
- Gendered language in prayer and rituals. While we stay grounded in our traditions and rituals, we also
 recognize the evolving nature of Jewish liturgy and expression and its need to reflect and convey inclusive
 intention and language. Like shuls (Conservative and Reform) in North America and beyond, we are
 examining prayers and rituals to recommend if and how they align with our Jewish values of being
 welcoming to and inclusive of all.

We'd really like to hear what YOU think is important and what you are looking for concerning rituals and worship at TBA or for yourself personally. While we hope to create a survey to better understand what you want to see more of at TBA, we don't have to wait until that survey is distributed. Join the ritual committee or one of the subcommittees described above. Let us know what you need and want related to ritual and worship at TBA. 


In honor of Purim, TBA will be sending Mishloach Manot to each member family, along with a scroll listing the names of all the families who are participating in this fundraiser.

When record producer and civil rights activist John Hammond arranged to have Benny Goodman play with pianist Teddy Wilson at a party in Forest Hills Queens in 1935, it was the beginning of a musical group that allowed for equality among the races in the USA for the first time. When Goodman and Wilson then met, first with drummer Gene Krupa and then with vibraphonist Lionel Hampton, they established the most popular musical group in the country, one which is highly influential to this day. The story of this event as well as the great music created by these musicians for almost 40 years will be the subject of this talk.

Marshall Zucker is a retired Principal of the Elmont School District and current Religious Educator of Congregation Beth Ohr in Bellmore, Temple Beth Am of Merrick and Bellmore and Merrick Jewish Centre. Mr. Zucker is a vibraphone/xylophone player and has a fountain of knowledge about music history.

TBA is once again repurposing the ancient ritual of counting the 49 days of the Omer between Passover and Shavuot.

- Religious School families will receive a package with items to help you count with us. It will be distributed this month.
- For those without children in Religious School, we will make these packages available to pick up at TBA.
- Items will also be available on our website for you to **download and print out at home** (except the big blue bag!)

TO DO:

- 1. Every day, add one of the suggested items* to your large, blue bag (or your own container) to donate to Feeding Westchester.
- 2. Every day, deposit money in a tzedakah jar to help feed the hungry in Israel through Leket, Israel's National Food Bank.
- 3. Every day, say a blessing as you do your counting!

DON'T FORGET:

- 1. Hang up the calendar and add a sticker each day.
- 2. Put the label on any empty jar or bottle to use to collect your tzedakah.
- 3. Keep your bag and tzedakah jar someplace visible and watch your donations grow!
- 4. Bring your non-perishable items to TBA at Shavuot services on Thursday, May 25 (7:00pm) or Friday, May 26 (9:00 am), or Shabbat Services on Friday May 26 (7:30pm) or Saturday May 27 (9:00am). You could even drop them off a little early on the last day of Sunday School, May 21 or at the picnic that day at 11:00am.
- 5. Bring your filled tzedakah jar to TBA at any of the times listed above.
