From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

As I write this, we have just learned that Israel's prime minister, Bibi Netanyahu, has agreed to postpone the Knesset vote on judicial overhaul that, depending on your political position, is either long overdue, or will

gut the country's democracy. My own sense, which I shared in a Shabbat sermon, is that some changes truly are needed, but many of the proposals are an attempt to thwart judicial review of any law a Knesset may pass. This would definitely be a threat to the democratic process.

Netanyahu's willingness to pause is a direct result of the very large demonstrations against the overhaul that show no signs of abating. That in itself is a sign that Israelis cherish their democracy, and they are willing to be tear-gassed, water-cannoned and arrested to make their sentiments known.

All of this is happening against the run-up to the celebration of Israel's 75th anniversary this month. Given what we have been watching unfold, and also that the two-state solution seems as far as ever from reality, we might be tempted to skip the celebration this year. I think that would be a mistake. Even with its problems, the very existence of an independent Jewish nation after 2000 years of exile is something to celebrate. We can certainly celebrate that fact while also acknowledging her failings.

Here's what I said at Israel's 70th anniversary:

It is very difficult for most of us alive today to understand just how miraculous both the declaration of the State and her survival against incredible odds have been. Today we see Israel as a successful, modern, cutting-edge society. There are certainly things to criticize, but the simple fact that we have the luxury to criticize Israel for such things as the status of liberal Judaism, the treatment of minorities or the level of childhood poverty is in itself an incredible statement. It is only when we are not facing existential questions that we can focus on other things. As far as I'm concerned, it is a tribute to Israeli society that at a relatively young age the country is willing to struggle with moral issues which still confound much older countries. At the age of 70,

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Shalom! Some of you have asked me if I have started a countdown clock toward retirement. My knee jerk reaction is NO, but when I look to Judaism to help organize my life, as I often do, I realize that I indeed have some countdown clocks. First, there is the list that I keep handy on my computer screen of who is chanting Haftarah during our Conservative Service. Then there is the notebook with an individual folder for each b-mitzvah student, both of which are getting smaller. And soon, we will ALL be counting as we count the *Omer* together.


As part of the Second Passover Seder, we will begin to count "the *Omer*," the counting of the days between escaping Egyptian slavery and moving towards freedom signified by receiving the Torah on *Shavuot* at Mt. Sinai. We count the time between planting and harvesting barley. There is a doxology (a liturgical formula) to mark the *Omer*. We recite the prayers and count the *Omer* in the evening, as a new "Jewish" day begins. There are many emotions as someone moves from slavery to freedom, and the weeks of the *Omer* are set up to acknowledge these emotions and help to move us through them. As I look at the weekly themes of the *Omer*, I reflect about my time at TBA:

Chesed — the **Loving-kindness** that I was shown from the very first time the search committee called and invited me to audition, to my first day working at TBA, to those who attended Barry's and my wedding, Tamir's *bris* and, *bar mitzvah*, Confirmation and Hebrew High School graduation, and so many more wonderful moments filled with love.

Gevurah — **justice and discipline** - TBA is a community that prides itself on the values of *Tikkun Olam*. I love watching our students begin mitzvah projects as early as Kindergarten and then seeing them choose when preparing to become a *b-mitzvah*.

Tiferet — **Harmony, compassion** – remembering all the people who have sung with me. Your sweet voices surround me at *Shabbat*, Festivals, High Holydays, and beyond. The congregation's compassion was felt during illnesses, after accidents, surgeries, and through notes, emails, texts, and Zoom calls when each of my parents passed away.

Netzach — **Endurance** – next year TBA will (B"H, with God's help) celebrate 125 years of existence. There are still members at TBA related to the founding members of this amazing congregation.

Hod — **Humility** – I am humbled to have served TBA for almost 29 years. I am grateful for all I learned by working here, and it has been a privilege to be with you during *simchas* and sorrows, and to call you family.

Yesod — **Bonding** - TBA's logo includes, "Join us. You already belong" because we are a family. Not only do we have families who can trace their family tree back to the first Jews in Tarrytown but I also love to look out at the congregation and see three generations of a family sitting together.

Malchut — **Sovereignty, leadership** -I want to take a moment to thank all our volunteers. It takes a village to raise a child and it takes a village to raise a community. The members of TBA show how much they care for their community by volunteering to help in more ways than I can imagine.

There are many ways to count the *Omer*. You can find daily meditations on the emotions I listed above on the internet that can help you move through the seven weeks between Passover and *Shavuot*. I hope that you will seek out ones that are meaningful to you – and that you will participate in TBA's program to count the *Omer* by collecting food for the hungry. Each Religious School student has received a kit with explanations, calendars, blessings and all that you need to count the seven weeks/49 days of the *Omer* by collecting food or *tzedakah* to help feed the hungry in Westchester. If you don't have a child in Religious School you can come to TBA to pick up a packet or find all that you need on our website. The Haggadah says "let all who are hungry come and eat"; during this time you have an opportunity to fulfil this *mitzvah*.

This is in no way to write off Israel's challenges; it is simply to put them into some context. The world tends to hold Israel to a particularly high standard. The truth is that American Jews tend to do the same.

It's all still true five years later. We do and should hold ourselves and our brethren to a high standard.AND, we should be joyous at the things we have to celebrate. So let's do that. Here are two ways to celebrate:

First, join us for Shabbat services April 28–29 when we will be celebrating Shabbat Israel.

Second, mark your calendars on Sunday, May 21, 2-5pm when we join the Westchester Jewish community celebrate. of the miracle that is the 75th anniversary of the State of Israel. Specific details, including location, will follow. This is a party you really do not want to miss.



Passover Vocabulary


Chametz

Is dough that has not been prepared according to the rules of Passover, or any food that has come in contact with *Chametz*. Dishes and utensils that have touched *Chametz* become *chametzdik* and should not be used during Passover.

Chametz is also known as "leavened bread."

Bedikat Chametz

(The Search for and Removal of Leaven) - On the night before Passover, the family does a "formal search" to find any stray crumbs hidden in corners or cabinets, some of which will be deposited deliberately so that they may be found. Kids love this! Traditionally, we use a candle for light, but you might substitute a flashlight. The crumbs are swept with a feather into a little bundle, and on the next morning all is burnt. The short prayers, which are to be recited as part of these rituals, may be found at the beginning of any *Haggadah*.



Mechirat Chametz

(Selling One's *Chametz*) – Observance of Passover is more than avoiding the eating of bread. Full observance also includes the removal from our homes of all leavened food (*chametz*) as well as all dishes and utensils that have been 'connected' with *chametz* during the rest of the year. That's a big job! In order to lessen the hardship, the Rabbis decreed that all non-Passover items may remain in one isolated spot in your home (e.g. a closet, the basement), as long as it passes out of your ownership. From this arises the custom of "selling *chametz*." To avoid having *chametz* in your possession during Passover, please fill out the "Sale of *Chametz*" form below and return it to the Office so that Rabbi Holtz can arrange this for you.

Helpful Information for a Joyous Passover

On the eve of the fourteenth of *Nissan*, the first *Seder* night, Jews all over the world assemble with family members and friends in homes or public places to commemorate the deliverance of the Israelites from Egyptian bondage over thirty-two hundred years ago.

The Seder ceremony is comprised of many elements of historical narration and ritual, special foods and hymns. They follow one another in a certain order – in fact, the word Seder means order – just as they have for hundreds of years. It's easy for one or more members of the household to conduct the Seder, and for everyone at the table to participate, because everything to be done and to be said is compiled in one book, the Haggadah. With a little preparation, anyone can lead a Seder!

- 3. Keep your bag and tzedakah jar someplace visible and watch your donations grow!
- 4. Bring your non-perishable items to TBA at Shavuot services on Thursday, May 25 (7:00pm) or Friday, May 26 (9:00 am), or Shabbat Services on Friday May 26 (7:30pm) or Saturday May 27 (9:00am). You could even drop them off a little early on the last day of Sunday School, May 21 or at the picnic that day at 11:00am.


