From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

One of Cantor Margot's favorite words is "liminal." It comes from Latin, meaning "threshold." Liminal moments are threshold moments, doorway or gateway moments, times of moving from one status

to another. We can sometimes see the change of the status in the very words we use. A good June example is "graduation," which is often also called "commencement." One word connotes an ending, while the other suggests a beginning. A student enters a graduation ceremony at the end of their studies and emerges into the commencement of the next part of their life.

I wrote last year that in synagogues, the month of June is filled with liminal moments. A membership year ends and another begins. Our religious school year ends, with the promise of return. June is when we install our new officers and trustees. And June is also the appointed time for staff transitions.

Cantor Goldberg, whom we first met as Cantor Bermas, has been part of the TBA family for twenty-nine years. She, along with Barry and Tamir are fixtures here, and, while we may not see her much in the coming year, she (and they) most definitely remain a part of our family even as she transitions to her new role as Cantor Emerita. I know you will miss her daily presence, as will I; Cantor Margot and I have worked together, six and sometimes seven days a week, for nearly three decades! That is a lot of togetherness! So, it's truly not possible for me to fully express what this particular liminal moment means to me personally. What I can tell you is this: I would not have become the rabbi that I am without her partnership, and for that I will always be grateful.

One important note about liminal moments: while they often have a component of wistfulness and loss, they just as often also contain joy and promise. One chapter closes, and at the same time, a new one begins. The story itself does not end; it evolves. We are incredibly fortunate to have found a warm, talented and spiritual cantor with whom we begin the next chapter in the life of our 124 year-old congregation. I am confident that together we will weave Cantor Lauren Fogelman and her family into the ongoing story of Temple Beth Abraham. I hope that you will make an effort to be at services during the summer as we all get to know Cantor Lauren.

Notes from Cantor Margot E.B. Goldberg

Shalom! WOW and THANK YOU! I am still floating from the May gala celebration in my honor. What a wonderful evening to celebrate our time together and to support TBA. Thank you to Risa Swersey and her amazing team, Melissa Baer, Julie Gur, Sharon Kirschner, Jenny Libien, and Meredith Siegel, for creating the perfect event. One of the most incredible things for me about the evening was the guest list. I was able to look out at the crowd and see folks representing each segment of my time at TBA. There were members attending from long before I arrived, to members who joined during my tenure, and even folks who only recently joined. It was wonderful to see you ALL in the room. Again, thank you to everyone who participated!

On July 1, I will step into a new role at TBA as your Cantor Emerita. According to the dictionary, an *emeritus* is "a retired college professor or minister. When a professor stops teaching, she might be given the title of *emeritus*, which basically means she can still be remembered as a successful professor." I do not imagine I will ever stop teaching and I absolutely believe that my time at TBA has been successful, so what does it mean to be Emerita?

One of my favorite Jewish terms revolves around the idea of *tzimtzum*. In an article written by Rabbi Rick Jacobs, he explains "the Lurianic Kabbalistic creation myth, *tzimtzum* is the act of contracting, to make space." Some theologians reflect that when God wanted to create the world, first God needed to *tzimtzum*, God needed to contract, to take a step back and make space, so that there would be a place to put the universe. I am certainly not comparing myself to God, but the idea of *tzimtzum*, of making space, is how I view being an Emerita. Barry, Tamir and I plan to remain a part of the community, and when Rabbi David, Cantor Lauren and the community require my assistance, I will do my best to help in whatever way I can.

The American Conference of Cantors recommends that a Cantor Emerita remain at a distance from the community during the first year of retirement. This makes good sense. For all of us it is a time of transition and change – and it will give each of us time to settle into our new roles. For me, it will mean more time with Barry and Tamir. For Rabbi David and Cantor Lauren, it means time for them to get to know each other, for Cantor Lauren it is time for her to find her footing and get to know you, and for the congregation it will be time to become acquainted with our new cantor.



STESSA PEERS DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION AND YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

2022-2023 has been an incredible year for our Religious School and our four youth groups, ZEETY, ZEETY678, ZEETYTeeny, and ZEETYKatan. From Kindergarteners through High School Seniors and teen aides, we engaged 160 teens and youth at Temple Beth Abraham. This year, it felt like we really built more community at TBA and I am so excited to continue building our amazing community!

This year, we held more school and youth events than we have ever held before! Each grade had a mitzvah project (the 2nd graders even went to the Greenburgh Nature Center to plant trees!), we had over 80 youth programs, we reinvigorated our 6th Grade Living Museum, had an amazing 5th Grade Yom Haatzmaut program, brought the Bible Players in, many speakers, the Purim Circus, 10 Sunday Fundays, the 7th grade had a model BMitzvah, K-5 met for 2 family ed programs each, and 6th met 3 times (plus seasons meetings) AND the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th-12th all had shul ins (sleepovers at TBA). And that is TRULY the tip of the iceberg!

I am beyond grateful to you all for entrusting me and our education team with your children and their Jewish Education; I am so excited for next year (can it be September already!?)

We embark on our 125th year at TBA so we have lots more new beginnings to celebrate together as we usher in the New Year this fall. This Year at Women's Circle

Women's Circle has a long history at Temple Beth Abraham, bringing the women of our congregation together once a month to share, learn and socialize. This year, it was my honor to lead Women's Circle. We started the year off with a Pot-Luck dinner outdoors in the playground. Several members brought raffles, including a glass sculpture made by Saara, potholders made by Ina's grandson, veggies from Loretta's garden, and a wine party basket by Bernice.



During the year, our volunteer speakers took us on a journey, exploring cultural, religious, and ethical aspects of Judaism, which sparked thoughtful conversations, and shared insights. Sue Kronish Grotenstein kicked off the season with a meditation on healing, accompanied by music and poems. Allison Fine led us in a discussion about reproductive justice, helping us understand the recent Supreme Court decision striking down Roe v. Wade, and develop awareness about medical and legislative alternatives to the protection we lost. Ilana Levitt led a workshop about the strong, sometimes wonderful, and sometimes challenging relationships we have with our mothers, and how much impact this relationship has in our adult lives. With Sharon DeLevie, we talked about Jewish names, who we were named for, and the emotions that accompany our identity with our names. Karen Filler told us about her history growing up in the Jewish camp run by her parents, and led us in a discussion about our camping experiences, and their lasting impact into our adult lives. Doris Unger shared short stories in which she re-imagined Bible stories from a woman's perspective. What was Eve thinking? Or Hannah? Or Lot's wife? We enjoyed reading and discussing her novel viewpoints. In the spring, with the waning of Covid, we started to meet in person (and on zoom). Stessa Peers led us off with a discussion about gender identity, and the rationale behind the emerging focus on the pronouns we use (he/him; she/her; they/them), and why it matters to be addressed by the pronouns that fit our identity. Senny Josephs brought us an inside look into the lived experience of the Jewish diaspora, sharing her story of growing up Jewish in Indonesia, and the special challenges of living as a secret Jew in your own country. Bernice Rogowitz shared insights into the importance of salt, and its formative role in our history, food, and lore, and hosted a tasting of salts from around the world.

We thank all the speakers for sharing their time and expertise, and feel really blessed to have experienced their knowledge, passion, and insights. We are reminded of the diversity and richness of our religion and culture, and feel joyful to be able to experience them together in a warm and supportive community.
