From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

It has been a very difficult year for the Jewish people. This is obviously true for Israelis, and it is true in a different way for those of us living outside the land of Israel. Here in America we have witnessed the difficul-

ties primarily on college campuses, in social media and through increased acts of antisemitism around the country. One thing we now know for sure, if we did not realize it before: much of the world, including highly educated folks like college faculty, does not distinguish between Jews and Israelis. Whether we agree with it or not and whether we like it or not, people attack Jews around the world because of actions taken by Israel. This is the reason that I believe anti-Zionism is indistinguishable from antisemitism. Criticism of Israeli actions or policies is neither anti-Zionism nor antisemitism (though it is often hypocritical, as the same actions taken by other countries are routinely ignored). Calling for the end of the Jewish state primarily because it is a <u>Jewish</u> state is clearly and by definition antisemitic. Defacing Hillel houses on American college campuses because of what Israel does is antisemitism. Calling for the deaths of American Jews because of what happens in Gaza is antisemitic. In fact, any slur or attack on an American Jew because of what happens in the Middle East means that, in the perpetrator's mind, all Jews are responsible for what Israel does. If for these people Israeli equals Jew, then there is no doubt that their anti-Zionism equals antisemitism.

But things are not all bleak! Jewish life here and around the world is robust. Our community is more united than ever. We have many allies of many faiths and all walks of life. Politicians and law enforcement have been vocal and active in their support of Jewish communities nationwide. The government and indeed the very laws of our country are on our side. This by itself makes this moment in Jewish history very different from those that have come before. The haters are loud and getting a lot of attention, but they are very much in the minority. Please keep that thought front and center when you find yourself despairing of the future.

Here at Temple Beth Abraham we are in the midst of celebrating 125 years of Jewish life in the Rivertowns. Our founding families were much

Hurricane Eden

Israel's participation in Eurovision this year was fraught with controversy thanks to the ongoing war with Hamas.

Its entry, a song that was ultimately titled "Hurricane," had to be revised several times before it would even be accepted into the competition. It's original title, "October Rain," represented an obvious reference to the events of October 7. That was deemed to be "too political" for the Eurovision organizers. After several revisions, "Hurricane" was turned into a heartfelt love song about a tumultuous relationship. This transition is not so farfetched if you're familiar with scripture, as the love poetry in the Song of Songs is said to be an allegory for God's love for Israel. And loving Israel is, indeed, complicated. Phrases like "Take me home and leave the world behind" were changed to be "Take it all and leave the world behind," ostensibly, it's not okay to publicly refer to Israel as a Jewish homeland. The closing Hebrew lyrics of the original submission, translate to "We are all good kids one by one." Apparently, Israelis can't refer to themselves as 'good kids" amidst the current crisis. Instead, the song ends with "You always leave me with one small light." At least it provides us with glimmers of hope and light during these seemingly endlessly challenging times.

But that's just the beginning. Outside of the Eurovision venue in Malmo, Sweden, protestors were relentless in their objection to Israel's participation in the contest. Naysayers claimed that the so-called human rights violations in Gaza were grounds for Israel's disqualification from the contest. Israel's Eurovision contestant, Eden Golan, was locked down in her hotel room outside of rehearsals and performances in order to ensure her safety. Nevertheless, Eden was a queen. In spite of significant boos and jeers (muted from the public broadcast by "anti-boo" technology), she performed with grace, strength, and passion. Objectively, I personally felt that her song and her performance was one of the strongest in the entire competition. Others agreed, and Eden managed to earn a very respectable fifth place showing!

How did Israel manage to place so high in spite of all of the controversy? Part of it was the fact that it truly was a beautiful song coupled with the fact that Eden's performance was so moving. In spite of this, Israel got very little help from the team of international judges, not one of whom gave their maximum votes to Israel. As I watched them announce their decisions, I thought about how much courage it would take for them to publicly state their choice of Israel – and sure enough, none of them did.

What really helped Israel was the voting of the general public - particularly those citizens of Western countries. Israel placed second in the com-

less accepted in American life than are we, their spiritual descendants. We thrive here not in spite of being Jews, but **because** we are Jews. Repairing the world *-tikkun olam* - begins locally. Our tradition teaches us to lend our gifts, our talents and our resources to the community and the country in which we live. Jews have done that wherever we have gone. Here in the Rivertowns we have been doing this for more than a century and we are justifiably proud of our forebears' contributions. I hope that our spiritual descendants 125 years from now will look back on what our generation does with the same sense of pride!

petition's public vote, earning the top spot in the UK, Australia, Belgium, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Portugal, Spain, San Marino, Sweden, and the Rest of the World (aka the United States and other countries not eligible for Eurovison). These results were likely impacted by the Jewish communities in these countries rallying together to vote for Israel and is an excellent example of how our communal strength can bring us out of the depths of despair.

May we continue to cultivate Jewish solidarity as we weather the hurricane of these tumultuous times. Let's continue displaying Israel's beauty to the world through her art, music, and culture as we work towards a return to peace and stability in the Jewish homeland.

2023-2024 has been an absolutely incredible year for our Religious School and our four youth groups, ZEETY, ZEETY678, ZEETYTeeny, and ZEETYKatan. From Pre-Kindergarteners through High School Seniors and teen aides, we engaged so many youth at Temple Beth Abraham through our classes, programs, and services. This year, it felt like we really built more community at TBA, and I am so excited to see this wonderful upward trend continue.

This year, we held more school and youth events than we have ever held before! Each grade had a mitzvah project, and we added new ones like the 1st grade making bird feeders; we had over 80 youth programs, reinvigorated our curriculum-and added classroom middot (Jewish values) and Tzedekim (Jewish Heroes)-had an amazing 5th Grade Yom HaAtzmaut program, brought Puppetworks, Sprout Camp, the Bat Mitzvah of our ShinShinit, Liri, Hope's Door, Morah Kimberly (Pre-K) and her new book Frankenstein's Matzah, and a Sofer in, had many speakers, and welcomed the Purim Circus.

This year we added new programs: we piloted a very successful Pre-K program, TBA Café (a parent initiative), we held ten Sunday Fundays, K-5 met for two family ed programs each, and the 6th grade met three times (plus seasons meetings) AND the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th-12th all had shul-ins (sleepovers at TBA). I know it sounds like quite a mouthful, but it is TRULY only the tip of the iceberg!

I am beyond grateful to you all for entrusting me and our education team with your children and their Jewish Education; I am so excited for next year (can it be September already!?)




