#### From Rabbi Holtz's Study

Dear Friends,

In 1897, Theodor Herzl gathered representatives from all over the Jewish world in Basel, Switzerland, for the first World Zionist Congress (WZC). It became the deliberative body of the World Zionist Organization, which is, in effect, the parliament

of world Jewry.

It is the one Jewish body where democratically elected delegates of every Zionist organization in the world can come together to discuss issues affecting us all. In addition, the WZC controls four Israeli non-profits that together provide millions of dollars to Israeli society. To learn more about the WZC, visit <a href="mailto:arza.org/wzc">arza.org/wzc</a>

Every five years the world Jewish community elects representatives to the WZC. Elections will begin this March! The American Zionist Movement (AZM) will have 145 seats in the next congress, with delegates chosen by popular vote across all the streams of American Judaism. We want AZM delegates who will advocate for the things we liberal Jews believe in: religious pluralism and equality, women's rights and peace with dignity. So it is absolutely imperative that every Reform and Conservative Jew participates so that we are well represented.

Here is a summary of the liberal Jewish platform:

- Women's Rights & Gender Equality We strive to create a world in which gender equality is the rule - where men and women can pray, work and live together as equals deserving of the same respect and honor.
- Religious Equality We envision and work for a society in which all denominations are treated fairly and with respect and all of us are seen as Jews, regardless of our level of observance.
- Security in the Region Lasting peace, security and stability for Israel, the Palestinians and the surrounding Middle East region is possible and although the road may seem long, we are building the path to that peace every day.

The Reform movement's Zionist body is ARZA (Association of Reform Zionists of America). The Conservative movement's equivalent is MERCAZ. A vote for either is a vote for the liberal Jewish values we hold dear.

In order to vote, you need to be at least 18 years old and consider yourself to be Jewish.

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#### Cantor's Notes

For the past 34 years, Temple Beth Abraham has been blessed with the presence of female cantorial voices. Cantor Naomi Hirsch assumed the pulpit in 1991, followed by Cantor Margot Goldberg's illustrious 29-year tenure from 1994-2023. I am fortunate to have followed in

Cantor Margot's footsteps beginning in July 2023, and for the past year and a half, I have had the honor of serving this joyful, spiritual, and dynamic sacred community.

TBA's long legacy of female cantors would not have been possible without the ordination sixteen years earlier of Cantor Barbara Ostfeld in 1975. Cantor Ostfeld was the first woman to be ordained as a cantor, paving the way for a field that is now filled with more women than men across liberal congregations in the United States. My own cantorial class, ordained in 2013, had ten women and no men. In reflecting upon her chosen profession, Cantor Ostfeld wrote, "Women cantors have altered the way in which prayer is offered, heard, and received."

Cantor Ostfeld also has a very important connection to our TBA community: she was the cantor who prepared Cantor Margot to become a Bat Mitzvah at Temple Beth El in Great Neck. Funnily enough, I also grew up in Great Neck, but at Temple Israel, the Conservative synagogue down the street. We had our own wonderful cantor, Cantor Raphael Frieder, who arguably has one of the best baritone voices in the business. Nevertheless, I wonder to this day whether I would have found my way to the cantorate sooner had I had a female cantorial role model like Cantor Ostfeld from an early age.

As we mark 50 years of women in the cantorate, the American Conference of Cantors (ACC) is embarking on a year-long celebration filled with special events, publications and other surprises. This summer's ACC convention in Washington, DC will be heavily focused on empowered female voices, culminating in a special gala concert. In addition, Transcontinental Music Publications will be publishing a special collection of choral music written by women in the cantorate.

The ACC plans to begin its official celebration of this milestone on Shabbat Shira (Shabbat of Song), which this year takes place during the weekend of February 7-8. Shabbat Shira is the Shabbat during which we read the Torah portion Beshalach, which contains the song that the Israelites sang as they crossed the Red Sea into freedom. This section of Torah is known as Shirat Hayam, or the Song of the Sea. The Haftarah that coincides with this portion comes from the Book of Judges and also contains a Biblical Song – in this case, it is the military victory song that Deborah sings after the Israelites defeat the general of the opposing army. Both the Torah and Haftarah portions on Shabbat Shira are driven by music and by strong female voices. This makes it an opportune time to honor women in the cantorate.

Much of the music we will sing during Shabbat evening services on February 7 will highlight female composers. Some of you might be worried that focusing on music by female composers means that we'll be doing a lot of new music for *Shabbat Shira*. That is actually not the case! This year, February 7 happens to be a Family Shabbat. Our opening medley for

February's bulletin is one of my favorites to write because I get to talk about a special program that we run every year. The *Mishloach Manot* program is both TBA's Religious School's, and our Pincus Fund's, largest fundraiser and is also our Third Grade's *Mitzvah* Project.

This fundraiser is also how we're able to provide our TBA members with *Mishloach Manot*, a beautiful tradition of sending gifts to friends and community members during Purim. By participating, you're not only contributing to our community but also helping to make this meaningful *mitzvah* a reality!

I am sure you have some questions... What is *Mishloach Manot*? What is the Pincus Fund? How exactly does the Third Grade *Mitzvah* Project tie into it? Don't worry; I'll give you the inside scoop!

#### What is Mishloach Manot?

Mishloach Manot means, literally, sending portions. Manot comes from the word manna, which is what our ancestors ate in the desert. Mishloach Manot are Purim baskets containing gifts of food or drink that are sent to family, friends, and others during Purim. In the Book of Esther, it states, "Therefore the Jews of the villages, that dwelt in the unwalled towns, made the 14th day of the month of Adar a day of gladness and feasting, a holiday, and of sending portions to one another." It is a mitzvah, an actual commandment, to participate in sending Mishloach Manot! It ensures that everyone has enough food for Purim and is meant to increase love and friendship amongst our Jewish community.

#### What is the Pincus Fund?

The Kate and Harry Pincus Religious School Scholarship Fund (The Pincus Fund) exists because Sherman Pincus, z''l, and his family believed that Jewish education should be attainable for all families regardless of their financial situation. The Pincus Fund gets replenished by major contributions made at Purim time through this fundraiser. It is very important to our school and our community. While "scholarship" is the word that we sometimes use, it is this fundraiser that enables us to make sure that everyone can receive a Jewish education at Temple Beth Abraham. It also is an incredible way to get involved at TBA and feel connected. Those who participate are listed on our *Mishloach Manot* scroll!

#### How does the Third Grade *Mitzvah* Project tie into it?

Here is where the Third Grade *Mitzvah* Project comes in. For those in our community who are home-bound and unable to attend the Purim service and *Shpiel*, our Third Graders and their families will be delivering *Mishloach Manot* on March 16th. The Third grade *mitzvah* project encompasses *Talmud Torah*, which is the commandment to study and teach Torah and, further, to help others understand or experience Judaism. If you are home-bound and would like a *Mishloach Manot* basket delivered to you, please email <u>SPeers@tba-ny.org</u>. Then, on March 16th, if a family arrives at your door, please do not be startled; they most likely are there from TBA to perform the mitzvah of *Talmud Torah* and bring you *Mishloach Manot* greetings and goodies from your TBA family!

At Temple Beth Abraham, we believe in lots of different values, or *Middot*, that make us who we are. This year, each grade received Jewish values that are woven throughout their curricula, like *Chesed* (Loving Kindness), *Kavod* (Respect), *Ometz Lev* (Courage), *Sakranut* (Curiosity), *Rachamim* (Compassion), and *Savlanut* (Patience). Each of these *middot* helps us become better people, better *mensches*. One way we do this is by making Jewish community and Jewish education accessible for everyone. Through this fundraiser, we are able to add to the Pincus Fund, which in turn makes Jewish education more accessible for all. This is exemplified by this fundraiser; whether you receive your *Mishloach Manot* at our Purim Services and Shpiel on March 13th, or have it delivered by our 3rd graders on March 16th, we make sure that there is a *Mishloach Manot* basket for each family.

Mark Your Calendars! We are so excited to announce that our teen-led Purim Carnival (and youth group fundraiser) is BACK on March 9th!

Family Shabbat services is already an all-female affair, featuring the sounds of Elana Arian (*Hinei Ma Tov*) and Faith Rogow (*Shiru Shiru*). Other female composers that we typically incorporate into our Family Shabbat services include Debbie Friedman (*Mi Chamocha* and *Mi Shebeirach*), Debbie Jacobson (*Bar'chu*) and myself (*Avinu Shebashamayim*). The fact that such a large percentage of the most beloved Shabbat melodies at TBA are written by women is a testament to how far women have come in Jewish life, culture, and leadership over the past fifty years.

In addition, our fifth grade class will be helping us lead the service that night. Morah Marla and I have been teaching our learners about the significance of Shabbat Shira while introducing them to important texts and melodies about freedom and female empowerment. They'll be leading two well-known settings of texts from Parshat Beshalach (Ozi V'Zimrat Yah by Shefa Gold and "Miriam's Song" by Debbie Friedman). They are also learning what I believe to be one of the most important pieces of Israeli music: Al Kol Eileh by Naomi Shemer. Shemer was literally a pioneer among the pioneers who settled in Israel, having been born in 1930 in Kvutzat Kinneret, a Kibbutz in the Galilee that her parents helped to found. "Al Kol Eileh" teaches us about the important partnerships between humanity, nature, and God. Essentially, you can't have bitterness without sweetness – and vice versa. This is important to remember as we read the Song of the Sea because while the Israelites were able to pursue their path towards freedom, many Egyptians drowned once the waters came back together.

On this particular Shabbat Shira, closing our service with the poignant words of Al Kol Eileh will be a wonderful way to connect the voices of two pioneer women: Naomi Shemer and Cantor Barbara Ostfeld. Shemer succeeded and excelled in a male-dominated music industry, writing many of Israel's most beloved pieces of music (Yerushalayim Shel Zahav and Lu Y'hi are also in her catalogue). Cantor Ostfeld bravely enrolled in an all-male cantorial program. "Up until that time, if you saw a woman on the bima in a synagogue, she was giving the sisterhood report, or making announcements, or saying something about the oneg," she told the Milken Archive of Jewish Music.

The world at large – and our TBA community in particular – is richer because of the contributions of these two remarkable women. Like Shemer, Cantor Ostfeld is a wordsmith, author, and artist. She wrote the following blessing in celebration of 50 years of women in the cantorate:

"Bless all who pray beneath a crowded tent and all who pray in isolation. Bless everyone who hears a chanting voice and all who sense its power. We who chant gather your sounds, the ring of your timbrels braiding them holy, sending them up."

#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF WOMEN IN THE CANTORATE

In 1975, just 50 short years ago, Barbara Ostfeld was ordained as the first female Cantor by the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. Prior to that, while there had been women serving as prayer leaders (zogerin), women singing and recording hazzanut, and even women who were given the professional title of Cantor, there had never been a woman ordained and recognized as a full member of the clergy.

According to accounts dating back to the 12th century, women have long used their voices to lead the Jewish people in prayer. While most remain nameless, the gravestone of Urania of Worms (d. 1275), states she "chanted *piyyutim* (liturgical poems) and supplications for the women." Technological innovations over the last century have brought us recordings of such beloved *Khazantes* as Lady Cantor Madam Sophie Kurtzer (1896–1974), Jean Gornish (known as Shaindele di Khaznte, 1915–1981), and Fraydele Oysher (1913–2003). Their voices, and so many others, led the way for the women who would become Cantors after them.

Before the 1970s, women studying at HUC-JIR in the School of Sacred Music, now the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music, were preparing to serve in congregations as music teachers and choir directors. Following the 1972 ordination of Sally Priesand as the first female rabbi, the Reform Movement began to consider formal ordination of women Cantors.

Within just a few short years of Cantor Ostfeld's ordination, her impact was seen and heard. Many more women followed her into the ranks of the cantorate, changing the sound of Jewish music as they went. Throughout the 1980s and into the 1990s, women cantors greatly influenced the character of the profession and of Jewish American life in general. Cantors Vicki Axe and Judith Rowland were the first women presidents of the American Conference of Cantors (ACC), raising the female voice in leadership to a new level of significance.

Today, there are more women than men serving as Cantors of liberal congregations in the US. Adding women's voices to the cantorial canon has changed the sound of Jewish music and our Jewish community. Composers can now write new works for a variety of vocal ranges. Congregants can now see a full range of gender expressions on the bimah leading services. Indeed, the language of our liturgy now often reflects the inclusion not just of women, but also of those who identify as non-binary and transgender. In reflecting upon her chosen profession Cantor Barbara Ostfeld wrote, "Women cantors have altered the way in which prayer is offered, heard, and received."

Two levels of participation are available this year:

Sponsor Level: \$180. All Sponsors will be listed in the Sponsor section of the scroll. In addition, sponsors will receive an additional treat in their *mishloach manot* bag!

Member Level: \$72. All members who pay \$72 will have their names included on the scroll which is distributed with each basket.

Additional baskets may be purchased for \$18 each.

#### **Mishloach Manot FAQs**



#### What are mishloach manot?

Mishloach manot (sometimes referred to as Purim baskets) are gifts of food that family and friends exchange on Purim. We are instructed in the scroll of Esther (9:19) to send gifts to one another. Often presented in baskets, mishloach manot include at least two different types of food, including hamantaschen, the traditional three-sided pastry eaten on Purim. Many families purchase or bake hamantaschen to include in these baskets and to enjoy at home. Mishloach manot may also include a wide variety of foods and treats. These gifts may also be referred to by their Yiddish name, shalachmanos.

#### Why order mishloach manot through TBA?

There are many reasons to order through us. While some people enjoy making and distributing their own *mishloach manot*, others want to partake in the tradition but don't have the time to bake, buy, assemble, and distribute *mishloach manot*. We do all this for you! In addition, this is the major fundraiser for the Harry and Kate Pincus Religious Scholarship Fund. Profits from the sale of *mishloach manot* allow TBA to provide tuition assistance to all families at TBA who are in need.

#### What happens when I order mishloach manot through TBA?

TBA makes one bag of Purim treats for every member household. These bags are available for families to pick up at the Purim Shpiel and during the week of Purim. We include a personalized letter to each household listing the names of those who sent them Purim greetings. When you order *mishloach manot* through us, you are adding your name to the list of members who sponsored these Purim greetings.

#### If I want to order additional bags to give to family/friends outside of TBA, is that possible?

Of course! Some families purchase additional bags to personally deliver to family and friends. When placing your order in the online system, you can tell us how many additional Purim bags you want. We'll make them and have them available for you to pick up during the week of Purim.

#### I want to order, but I want to pay with a check?


You can still order online, just choose the "bill my account" option. Then, mail or drop off your check, payable to "Temple Beth Abraham."

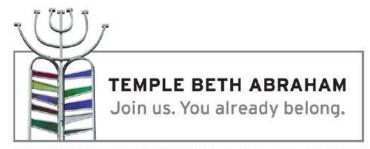
